

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Step-into England's story







December 1539

Anne of Cleves landed at Deal on her way to marry

1540

and Thomas Wingfield was made the first captain.

> **16**TH CENTURY

During a series of mutinies and uprisings across England, Deal Castle defected to the Royalist side.

A Parliamentarian force Royalists surrendered after a relief force was beaten on its way to the castle. Colonel Rich, the Parliamentarian commander of the besieging captain of Deal Castle.



17TH CENTURY

The resident captain, John Norris Esquire, began to alter Deal

1732

The alterations were finished, including a new house and garden for the captain.

> 18TH CENTURY

Deal Castle was no longer still kept four heavy guns. Deal remained a military/ naval town throughout the century (until the departure of the Royal Marines in 1996)

1860

Small ornamental gardens had been created on the outer bastions.



19TH CENTURY

The Captain's House and part of the moat wall of Deal Castle were destroyed by German bombing.

1950s

carried out by the Ministry of Works, restoring the castle as far as possible to its Tudor appearance.

1951

Deal Castle stopped being used as a captain's residence.

1972

A new captain was appointed after a gap of almost 20 years. Today, the captain is always the Commandant General of the Royal Marines.
