The *Register of Parks and Gardens of Historic Interest* is compiled by English Heritage. Although there are no additional statutory controls associated with registered sites, their inclusion on the Register is a material planning consideration and local planning authorities are required to consult the Garden History Society (GHS) on all applications affecting such sites. Planning applications referred to the GHS in Yorkshire and the Humber in 2006/7 totalled 49, to which the GHS made 13 written responses. 11 applications affected Grade I or Grade II* Parks and Gardens.

CARING AND SHARING: Funding and Investment

Heritage Lottery Fund

The Heritage Lottery Fund is the main source of public funding for the historic environment in the UK.

Since 1994, the Heritage Lottery Fund awarded 2,543 grants in the region, worth a total of £299,797,109.

*This year, projects have been reclassified to take into account the fact that some projects are multi-sectoral. e.g. a railway museum project might be classified as both Industrial Maritime & Transport, and as a Museum. In such cases the figures are divided equally between the categories. This has resulted in a slight redistribution of amounts awarded to each Heritage Area, and a drop in the amount attributed to Museums libraries archives and collections.

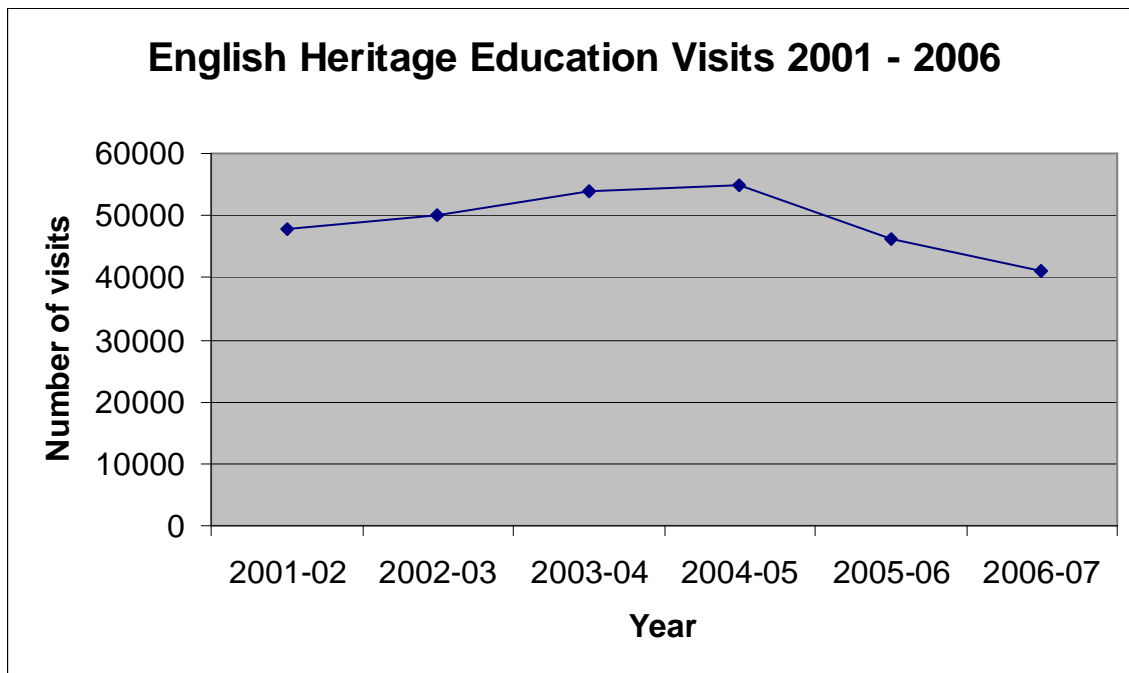

- **USING AND BENEFITING: Taking Part Survey**

Heritage Counts 2006 was the first edition to report results from the Taking Part survey, a continuous national survey of nearly 30,000 adults each year aged 16 and above living in a representative cross-section of private households in England. The survey measures attendance at historic environment sites widely defined to include, for example, a visit to a city or town with historic character. It was set up specifically to provide the evidence base for assessing whether the historic environment and other cultural sectors have met the Public Service Agreement (PSA) target set following the 2004 Spending Review to increase participation by under-represented groups. The PSA3 target set for the historic environment sector by the DCMS is, by 2008, to increase by three percentage points the proportion of adults from these three under-represented groups visiting designated historic environment sites. The final baseline for this target was set in late 2006 based on the first full year's results from the survey. The survey results from 2007-08 available in late 2008 will determine whether or not the sector has met its target. *Heritage Counts 2009* will be able to report on these results.

In June 2007, the DCMS published provisional estimates from the Taking Part survey for the first six months of 2006/07.

The key to interpreting the results of the Taking Part survey is to understand that as a sample survey, each figure quoted is an estimate which is subject to sampling error and thus has a statistical confidence interval attached to it. Each result reported here includes the range that is suggested by the 95% confidence interval. So when we report that 69.1% of all adults attended a designated historic environment site in first six months of the survey, we are actually saying that we can be 95% confident that somewhere between 67.5% and 70.7% of all adults attended.

- **Economic Benefits**

The *Survey of Visits to Visitor Attractions 2006*, published by Visit Britain shows that 2,220,585 people visited Historic Properties in Yorkshire and the Humber, representing 8% of visits to such attractions nationally. Eight of the top ten most popular paid for attractions in the region are heritage sites.

The Historic Houses Association (HHA) represents 88 historic houses, castles and gardens in Yorkshire and the Humber that remain in private ownership. 37 properties provide public access. 1,129,630 members of the public visited HHA properties in the 12 months leading up to May 2007, representing over 8.5% of the total number of visitors nationally.
