Try your hand at Stone Age Crafts, with Memma the Cavewoman and her team of prehistoric experts in the craft village; pull up a picnic blanket and settle into the talks tent for a line-up of Arts & Archaeology talks and discussions hosted by Stone Club Co-Founder Matthew Shaw (don't miss Phil Harding's captivating stories about the start of his love affair with flint here in the 70's). Or get out and explore the landscape with our new family trail, where you may stumble upon our resident storyteller, 'The Yarnsmith of Norwich,' who will be spinning tales all weekend out in the hollows. Join a field trip with with one of our experts or tag along with Andy Burnham from Megalithic Portal on their quest to find the long lost Puddlingstone. All of this before you've even descended into the mines to see our new audio-visual projections!

With brand new Landscape Trails, exhibition space, and a new Audio Visual Pit experience, Come and explore this Neolithic Flint Mine like it's never been seen before!

PHIL HARDING of Time Team fame, as a young man Phil excavated at Grimes Graves and discovered his love for all things flint and stone. He may 'bash a stone' at the festival as he tells tales of yore of past archaeological glories - "I left a lot of my heart at Grimes, and a good chunk of my liver too...."

JAMES CANTON author of Grounded: A Journey into the Landscapes of our Ancestors, Waterstones Best Book of 2023: Nature & Travel, will explore the close connection our ancestors had with the landscapes they lived in. Inspired by the beauty of East Anglia and seeking that lost connection, James Canton will take us on a journey across ancient England: from stone monuments to sacred groves, places of pilgrimage and sites of religious worship.

MARY-ANN OCHOTA is a broadcaster, author,
National Trails Ambassador and explorer of Britain's
ancient secrets in her books Secret Britain: Unearthing
our Mysterious Past (2020) and Hidden Histories:
A Spotter's Guide to the British Landscape (2018).
Come with her as we journey along lost routes and
tangled webs of connections across the landscape,
following in the footsteps of our ancient ancestors.

DR VERITY BIRT will be bringing a brand new site specific performance art work to Grimes Graves in collaboration with artist TOM SEWELL as part of Saturday evening's closing ceremony. Verity is a contemporary artist whose practice takes in writing, performance and sound. VAL THOMAS author Of Chalk and Flint: A Way of Norfolk Magic, celebrates the county of Norfolk and its tradition of magic and witchcraft. The spiritual energy which informs and powers this magic wells up from the land itself and from the Chalk and Flint which have shaped the landscape, its flora, its fauna, its culture and its history. Val will lead us in a blessing of the site, invoking the spirit of place via her Charms to the Lord and Lady of Chalk and Flint.

DAVID SMITH is an award-winning flint worker and architect, author of Building With Flint: A Practical Guide to building with flint in architecture and design; and an artist, whose material explorations have fused together flint and chalk via the heat of the furnace to make one-of-a-kind glassware. David will be talking at Flint Festival about his expansive work with flint, alongside leading a guided field trip around the local town of Thetford on Friday the 14th June from 6.30pm.

OLIVER PAYNE is an artist, sound designer, musician, and founder of Eastern Ear and the Yarmonics Festival. His work focuses on discovering the unheard and unusual through unique sound experiences and kinetic sculptures, improvised performance and sound-based mark making. For the Festival, he will be remaking Christian Wolf's iconic Stones using objects from the site to take us on a sonic journey! SIMON KANER Executive Director and Head of Centre for Archaeology and Heritage at the Sainsbury Institute for the Study of Japanese Arts & Cultures, places Norfolk's prehistoric archaeology in an international context and explores the power of archaeology to contribute to health and well-being. ANCIENT HOUSE MUSEUM'S TEENAGE HISTORY CLUB

will bring their unique perspectives to Grime's Graves through brand new experimental film and sound works shown here as 'works in progress'. These film and sound pieces have been made whilst working with Norwich based Sound Artist Oliver Payne and Film Maker Lewis Wickwar as part of Grime's Graves Digging Deeper project. These new collaborations were made possible thanks to funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

Alongside screening their new films, you can find members of the Teenage History Club out in the landscape on Saturday demonstrating obsidian knapping at Grimes Graves for the first time. Since 2016 the group have been part of a cultural exchange programme in honour of the site's twinning with the Neolithic obsidian mine Hoshikuso Obsidian Mines near Nagawa, Japan.

MEGALITHIC PORTAL Andy Burnham will lead walks to search for the famous 'Puddingstone of Grime's Graves'. Is there a lost Neolithic trade route that took high quality flint from the mines at Grimes Graves to Stonehenge? In 1952, Dr. Ernest Rudge certainly thought so and spent many years researching what he called a "Lost Highway" with puddingstone boulders marking the way...what will we discover? www.megalithic.co.uk
